The facility was originally used as a temporary home for children assigned by the Genesee County Probate Court, then as a daycare center and, since 2005, as a center offering programs for children with special needs and their families.

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Purpose of the Program

Mott Children's Health Center's ADHD Summer Treatment Camp program is a state of the art summer-day camp treatment program tailored specifically to the needs of children ages 6 to 11 with Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) and their families.

Children with Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) typically have significantly more difficulty with social adjustment and academic achievement. ADHD is also more likely to be a significant source of stress to parents, other family members and teachers as well.

About the Program

Approximately 70 hours of professional contact with the children and families are provided.

Services are targeted at:

- Improving the social problem solving, academic, sports and behavioral skills of the children;
- Strengthening the supervision/monitoring, problem solving, negotiation, teaching and limit setting skills of the parents and/or other caregivers.
- The camp will have a ratio of two-to-three children to each staff member with clinical supervision provided by a Mental Health Specialist (Master level, Licensed Clinician) with expertise in the assessment and treatment of ADHD and general behavior disorders.

How the Program Works

The children will participate in a daily behavior management program designed to maximize their ability to be:

- Successful in social situations
- Make the connection between behaviors and consequences that are essential to learning

Learn how to manage their behaviors in a typical academic setting, taught by experienced teachers.

At the same time the primary caregivers of the children will be learning to use the same behavior management techniques at home that the staff uses at the camp. This is crucial to the children's success following camp.



Questions & Answers About ADHD Camp

How do I know if the Mott Children's Health Center ADHD Summer Treatment Camp is the right choice for my child and our family?

If your child has been diagnosed with Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD), then your family may benefit from participating in the Camp. This may be especially true if medications have not "fixed" the problem. The Camp is designed to help children ages 6 to 11 learn how to better manage their behaviors, and to help parents and families better cope with the challenges of ADHD.

What are the benefits of participation?

The ADHD Summer Treatment Camp is an intensive, 2-week experience that will provide children and families over 70 hours of professional contact time and training. It is designed to help families help their children with ADHD be as successful as possible.

Is this camp just for children?

The Camp is not "just for kids!" Participation in the ADHD Summer Treatment Camp requires a time commitment from children and parents. Specifically, the Camp requires the participation of at least one parent or a guardian for each child enrolled. We know parents work, and have arranged the camp schedule to allow parents' participation to take place in the evenings.

5:00pm - 7:30pm - Parent training

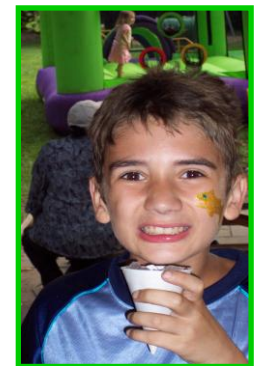
Child care provided during training.
